While Royston Ho first stepped onto the volleyball courts at St Hilda's Second ary School five years ago, his teacher-coach fee Siew Lan, would not have imagined he would grow into the young man he is today.

As a Secondary 1 student, Royston (above) already was of a good height to play volleyball, but Teo wondered if he would have been able to shed his timidity.

Speaking to The New Paper yesterday, Teo salit: "He played velleyball at primary school level, but primary school skills and secondary school skills are very different, so he struggled when he came.

"I remember when he was in C (Division) Boys in 2010, I made him the vicecaptain and he totally couldn't perform.

"He knew the team depended on him a lot, but he didn't have the maturity and the confidence to carry on and he played hadle."

But Royston is now transformed.

In April, he led 8t Hildu's to a 3-2 victory over Pungget Secondary School in the B Division boys' volleyball flual, reclaiming the title they lest to Shuquin Secondary School last year.

Despite his struggles on and off court - he was retained in Secondary 3 - his resilience and sense of responsibility have seen him through the tough

Now a Secondary 4 Normal (Academic) student, the boy who kept quietly to himself as he went about his business is today a leader who has the respect of his peers and is looked up to by the juniors.

Royston, who stands 1.86m tall, firmly believes in building the team off the court as well as on it.

Open up

He said: "Ttried to open up more with my teammates and, hopefully, they will be open with me at the same time.

"During the weekends or after training sessions, we'll go out for dinner or watch a movie so that we can talk more and understand each other. If one person is down, we'll know what to say to cosset better ters.

"Volleyball is a team game so it's very important to sacrifice some stuff for the team."

Aloysius Neo, captain of the Secondary 3 team, said: "Royston's not a very outspoken person but he makes a lot of sacrifices that we don't see.

"He has grown as a leader and he's the one we talk to when there's a team problem.

"He acts like someone who will take care of us and tries to make the juniors feel comfortable with the seniors."

While he has changed much over the last few years, Royston retains his moderty. He has been approached to play for the national team, according to Teo, but he declined the opportunity as he wanted to focus on his studies.

Said Teo: "Volleyball has really helped Royston to grow from a young boy into a young man and I'm very hap-

"He shows the determination and the fighting spirit that really brings up the whole learn.

"Without him this year, I don't think we could have been champions."
